

Interrogation of Alfred JODL

JODL was interrogated principally with reference to a number of documents, only some of which could he identify. He identified Document C-103, which contains his signature, but had no comment to make thereon. He identified the signature of Admiral BUEKNER on Document C-2 but could not recall the substance of the document. He did not identify Document R-130, stating that he had never seen it before. He identified KEITEL's signature and initial on Document 537-PS but stated that he had never seen the document before. He identified WEIN's signature on Document C-145 but stated that he had never seen the document before. He could not identify the signature on Document 1276 PS, although he thought it might be the signature of MUELLER; he stated that he had never seen the document before. With reference to Document 532 PS, JODL stated that he remembered the order being drawn up but that he had caused its cancellation because he believed that parachutists in BRITTANY were combat men and therefore not within the terms of the HITLER order of 18 October 1942. JODL identified Document C-50 but said that he had not participated in the discussion leading up to its issuance. JODL stated that he remembered Document 531 PS but could not recall the decision reached thereon; he identified WARLIMONT's signature appearing thereon.
